<b>SEP 2</b>	<p><b>Developing and Using Models:</b> A practice of both science and engineering is to use and construct models as helpful tools for representing ideas and explanations. These tools include diagrams, drawings, physical replicas, mathematical representations, analogies, and computer simulations. Modeling tools are used to develop questions, predictions and explanations; analyze and identify flaws in systems; and communicate ideas. Models are used to build and revise scientific explanations and proposed engineering systems. Measurements and observations are used to revise models and designs.</p>

## ASET Grade Band Criteria (Grade Band: 6-8)

### Science & Engineering Practices

**SEP 2: Developing and Using Models:** Modeling in 6–8 builds on K–5 experiences and progresses to developing, using, and revising models to describe, test, and predict more abstract phenomena and design systems.

By the end of the grade band **students** will have had a structured opportunity to develop an understanding of each of these. Individual lessons or units should include opportunities for **students** to practice one or more of the following components .....

<p>1) <b>Describe</b> components and characteristics of models</p>	<p>Using a model they developed, or an existing model, students:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. <b>specify/identify</b> observable and unobservable elements of the model (and their attributes) <b>needed to explain</b> the phenomenon or communicate the desired information</li> <li>b. <b>describe</b> the key relationships or interactions among model elements as they relate to the phenomenon or aspect of the phenomenon being addressed</li> <li>c. <b>describe</b> the correspondence between specific model elements and relationships, and the relevant components of the real world object or phenomenon that they represent</li> </ol>
<p>2) <b>Develop</b> models consistent with prior evidence or theories to represent, explain, and/or describe a phenomenon</p>	<p>Students develop models that:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. are <b>consistent with prior evidence and scientific theories</b> about the phenomenon</li> <li>b. reasonably <b>represent, explain,</b> and/or <b>describe</b> both <b>literal</b> and <b>unobservable</b> features of scientific phenomena</li> <li>c. include only components and <b>relationships that are relevant</b> to the purpose of the model</li> </ol> <p>Using these models students:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. define and clearly <b>label all the essential variables</b> or factors (components) within the system being modeled, including uncertain and less-predictable variables</li> <li>b. describe/demonstrate the <b>relationships</b> among the components of the model, including relationships that are not directly observable, but predict observable phenomena</li> </ol>
<p>3) <b>Use</b> models to describe relationships between components, predict outcomes, and/or test ideas to explain a phenomenon</p>	<p>Using a model they developed, or an existing model, students:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Correctly and completely <b>describe the components</b> and mechanisms of a scientific phenomenon providing a causal account including mechanisms that are not directly observable</li> <li>b. Generate new knowledge including:             <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Construct a correct and complete <b>prediction</b> about a phenomenon</li> <li>ii. Generate data to <b>test ideas</b> about phenomena</li> <li>iii. Generate <b>testable</b> questions about phenomena</li> <li>iv. Make meaningful <b>comparisons</b> between phenomena</li> <li>v. Support their <b>own thinking</b> about and understanding of a phenomenon</li> <li>vi. <b>Apply</b> models to related phenomena</li> </ol> </li> </ol>

4) <b>Compare</b> and/or <b>evaluate</b> features and limitations of (a) model(s)	Using a model they developed, or an existing model, students: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. <b>Identify, describe, and evaluate</b> the appropriate boundaries and limitations of a model with respect to explaining the phenomenon or communicating the desired information</li> <li>b. <b>compare</b> and <b>evaluate</b> the ability of different models to accurately represent and account for patterns in phenomena, and to <b>predict</b> related phenomena.</li> </ul>
5) <b>Revise</b> models based on additional evidence*	Using a model they developed, or an existing model, students: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. <b>Modify</b> a model – based on evidence – to match what happens if a variable or component of a system is changed</li> <li>b. <b>Revise</b> a model <b>to increase its explanatory and predictive power</b>, considering additional evidence or aspects of a phenomenon.</li> </ul>
